

Catchment Management Authorities (CMAs) across Victoria are about to embark on preparation of the fourth round of Regional Catchment Strategies.

RMCG has been there from the beginning, assisting CMAs in the preparation of the first Regional Catchment Strategies in 1997 and through each successive round of these critical regional plans.

We have a comprehensive understanding of the evolution of the Victorian Catchment Management Council (VCMC) Regional Catchment Strategy (RCS) Guidelines and of the strategies themselves.

The language and strategic basis for the strategies has evolved as our understandings of natural systems and community have grown. While the first round of strategies focused on identifying and addressing threats to natural resources in each region, the second round moved away from a 'threat-based approach' to focus on identifying natural assets in each region and enhancing their values. In the last round, an asset-based approach was applied to regional priority setting. In the next iteration many regions are planning to adopt a landscape or systems-based approach based around five key NRM themes: water, land, biodiversity, marine and coasts and community.

This evolution has resulted in improved regional priority setting and a clearer rationale for decision-making.

Robust monitoring, evaluation and reporting (MER) frameworks have also been adopted and there is growing ownership of RCSs amongst delivery partners.

Key enduring elements for the development of a successful RCS include:

- Strong engagement to build ownership by communities and delivery partners
- Place-based planning based around shared Integrated Catchment Management (ICM) outcomes
- · A reliance on a robust evidence base
- A focus on triple bottom line outcomes

 environmental, socio-cultural, and
 economic factors.

REGIONAL STRATEGIC PLANNING METHODS

PRIORITY SETTING PROCESSES

Key areas include:

- Understanding the scope and purpose of the priority-setting required in regional catchment strategies
- The systems, asset themes or landscapes to be considered, their scale and form for comparison, (and the relationships between them)
- Assessing the feasibility of actions an asset may be important but may be impossible or impractical to protect
- Consideration of both the costs AND benefits of actions and their importance for priority setting
- · How to manage information or knowledge gaps.

- Helping to implement priority-setting approaches, particularly where they involve partners and stakeholders.

COMMUNITY AND STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

PROJECT MANAGEMENT

They include the ability to manage diverse interests, to collate and interpret technical data and investigations, to anticipate key risks to the project and to design and manage strong project governance.
